INTRODUCTION

Get practical experience! Engage your intellectual curiosity! Enjoy your summer! Graduate early! For the first time this summer, the Department of Urban and Regional Planning is offering courses that will allow you to spread out your studies or to speed up your graduation.

A studio/workshop course will give you practical experience in helping a county's officials and residents promote village and town development while enhancing the area's special, natural landscapes. You will work on appropriate cultural, recreational, and tourism resources to meet county residents' needs and desires. You will also learn about the ways in which political bodies at various jurisdictional levels shape planning activities and outcomes.

Other courses will allow you to take electives, fulfill requirements, and explore your interests. The courses may fulfill graduation requirements for the Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Design and the Master of Urban Planning. Students from other programs may be admitted by permission of instructor, but should inquire at their home program about eligibility to use credits in pursuit of their degrees.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The courses will proceed only with sufficient enrollment.

COURSE/CREDIT/DESCRIPTION

Session I (May 31 - July 8 | In-person & On-Site)

END460SLB Environmental Design Workshop 4 (6 credits)

URP581/582LLB Planning Practicum (6 credits)

The special cross-listed studio/workshop will explore culture, recreation, and tourism planning for a county in western or central New York. The studio will engage students in community planning, environmental design, real estate development, and urban development fieldwork. Under the instructor's supervision, students will work with clients and town or village groups to understand complex community planning and environmental issues, research best practices, and proposed final plans, designs, and proposals. Involves lectures, discussions, and fieldwork.

Notes:

Undergraduates pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Design who wish to take the class must at a minimum have junior standing and have taken END350 or END 360 or both. Graduate students pursuing the Master of Urban Planning must have completed one semester of full-time study. Students from outside the University at Buffalo or outside the UB School of Architecture and Planning must have instructor's approval.

END413SEM/URP 527 Special Topics: Planning with Maps (3 credits)

For environmental designers and planners, maps have extensive applicability. They are tools for understanding the many interacting features of place, deliberating about land use and design options, and communicating ideas. Our seminar will work hands-on in applying contemporary mapping and illustration software to urban and regional planning. We will learn about depiction of municipal boundaries, land and water features, transportation and infrastructure alignments, and various land uses, and their relative positioning, acreages, and densities. We will then overlay maps for the evaluation of proposed land uses, as for environmental protection, heritage preservation, neighborhood design, roadways and transit, creation of high-activity mixed use areas, and the planning of industrial and business districts and parks and greenways. We will also learn how to illustrate these maps so they are attractive and legible.

Session III July 11 - August 19 | on-line

END494SEM Visions of the City (3 credits, remote)

Student-led, faculty-guided reading course covers classic and contemporary books on the natural, built, and urban environments. An undergraduate senior capstone course.
