- 2. Are you working on any research proposals this spring? In order to be better prepared for any proposals that will be submitted this spring, we'd like to hear from you. Let us know what proposals you are currently working on or are thinking about in the next few months so we can plan ahead!
- 3. The National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities will host the Health Disparities Research Institute from August 7 – 11, 2023. This weeklong program supports the research career development of promising early-career minority health and health disparities researchers. The program will feature lectures on minority health and health disparities research, mock grant reviews, seminars/small group discussions, and opportunities to engage with NIH staff. Applications are being accepted via the HDRI <u>online application</u> system until 5 PM on March 13, 2023. More information can be found on their <u>website</u>.
- 4. Travel and Reimbursement Reminders:
  - a. Travel Guidelines:
    - i. Please remember that you are *required* to get *prior approval* from your supervisor for ALL travel; <u>step-by-step video instructions are available here.</u>
    - ii. Flights and hotel bookings can be made using the Concur travel module;
    - iii. Tax exempt forms for <u>hotel</u> and other purchases must be used, as tax is not reimbursed. If you are traveling with sponsored research funds, please ask Barb Carlson for the appropriate forms.
  - b. Reimbursement Guidelines:
    - i. All reimbursements must have your supervisor's approval and be submitted through CONCUR;
    - ii. **Amazon purchases are** <u>not reimbursable</u>. If you need something from Amazon for a research project, please contact Barb Carlson.
    - iii. If you need assistance with the CONCUR system for reimbursement from a sponsored project, please contact Barb Carlson.

- 1. UB has a license for <u>REDCap</u>, a secure web platform for building and managing online databases and surveys. With this free service, you can avoid adding the purchase of survey/DB programs in your research proposals.
- The <u>Office of the Vice President for Research and Economic Development</u> (OVPRED) offers assistance in finding grant opportunities for researchers through UB Funding, grants for new and early career faculty, grants.gov, and limited submission opportunities.
- 3. In addition to the University at Buffalo's <u>SPIN Funding Database</u> to search for funding opportunities, other searchable databases include <u>New York State Grants Gateway</u> and <u>SBIR/STTR Funding</u>.

- 1. Sponsored Project Services (SPS) is enforcing the 5-day deadline for all grant submissions. If your proposal is not received at least five days before it is due, they may not review it. All proposals for sponsored research must be submitted through UB CLICK.
- 2. In addition, all proposals for sponsored research are required to be reviewed by Barbara Carlson and Nick Rajkovich. If you plan to submit a grant proposal, please let Barb and Nick know at least a week in advance to ensure a quick turnaround. In general, it will take one business day to get through the school review process.
